### Dashilar VI Project by Kenya Hara

Beijing's ancient district of Dazhalan (more commonly referred to as Dashilar) is the cultural and historic focal point of the Chinese capital, and central to BJDW's activities. The area has been reimagined by Muji's Kenya Hara, whose Dashilar VI Project maps out web of a 1.5-kilometer area of hutong-filled alleyways in 3D, bringing to life the physical context and giving the user a vivid impression of the visual life of the district. The paper map is an incredibly intricate graphic depiction of Dashilar, where every shop, house, courtyard and gallery is given dimension beyond that which a typical map can offer. For Hara, this exercise in urban information design works

because of the low-rise nature of Dashilar's architecture. The maps are also available for smartphones and tablets, as interactive software that gives visitors a holistic understanding and appreciation of the area as it guides them, directing them to Design Week hot spots. The map is complex but incredibly human, its design depicts every type of architecture as it exists, and includes details as small as the tiles on the hutong roofs and the trees in the courtyards. Never mind getting lost in Dashilar, you can get lost in Hara's fascinating map. ndc.co.jp

for Chinese furniture brand ACF: Home.
The word yifu translates from Mandarin as
"clothing" and the chair and sofa are inspired
by Asian garments like the Korean hanbok and
the Chinese hanfu, and draw on the distinctive
silhouette of these traditional gowns.
